Lunchtimes Just Got a Lot More Exciting!

This year, we have launched a brand-new lunchtime project focused on **child-initiated play** and it's already making a huge difference to our school day!

Each lunchtime, children have access to **two different sets of resources and activities**, designed to spark creativity, movement, and fun. These include:

- A disco with cheerleading pom-poms
- Large paper for doodling and drawing
- LEGO building
- Beanbags, hoops, balls and more!

The beauty of this approach is that children are free to use the resources **however they choose**, creating their own games, stories, and imaginative play experiences. It's been wonderful to see how engaged and enthusiastic they are — many children now say lunchtime is their favourite part of the day!

We have also noticed a **significant drop in injuries** and a rise in **positive interactions**, showing just how powerful purposeful play can be.

Many of our fundraising efforts this year will go towards **enhancing this provision even further**. We are hoping to introduce larger play items such as crates and tarpaulin for den building, large-scale art equipment, sensory toys, and a wider range of board games.

EYFS

The children in EYFS have had a wonderful start to their journey at big school! They are already showing great independence, settling into new routines, and feeling very grown up as part of our school community.

Our story focus this term has been *Handa's Surprise*. The children have loved exploring the story, writing their own lists of fruits using their initial sounds, and retelling the story in their own words. They have also been very creative, weaving beautiful baskets for Handa to carry to Akeyo, decorating fruit to place inside them, and even using real fruit to print with paint.

We are so proud of how quickly the children have embraced phonics. They have made an amazing start and are feeling very grown up with their very first reading folders. Already, their enthusiasm and progress in reading has been fantastic!

Year 1

This half term, Year 1 have been learning about the artist Paul Klee and have shown great creativity in producing their own portrait artwork. The children have explored a variety of shapes, identifying both *organic* and *non-organic* forms, and have experimented with different lines, mediums, and textures to enhance their work.

As part of their learning on the five senses, the children took part in a range of hands-on activities. They enjoyed exploring *feely boxes* to describe and identify different objects by touch, investigating *mystery pots* to experience a range of smells, and guiding each other *blindfolded* around the playground to develop trust and awareness. The children demonstrated a clear understanding of which body parts link to each sense and worked exceptionally well in pairs, showing cooperation and respect for one another.

We are also very pleased with the progress children are making in their reading. We would like to extend our thanks to parents and carers for their continued support with home reading (at least three times a week) and for encouraging children to practise their reading and writing in their pink books. Your support plays an important role in helping the children develop confidence and enjoyment in their learning.

Year 2

Our first topic of the year has been all about exploring our wonderful local area. The children loved learning about Whitwick and even went on a walk to discover its landmarks firsthand. They created some fantastic **Whitwick landmark collages** and produced excellent pieces of writing,





including a story retell and a non-chronological report inspired

by *Tad* by Benji Davies. It has been a brilliant start to the year — the children have shown great enthusiasm for their learning and have already made **fantastic progress**.

Multi-Skills Event - Year 2 had the exciting opportunity to take part in their very first sporting event, representing the school at the **Multi-Skills Festival** held at Coalville Leisure Centre. The children showed fantastic enthusiasm, teamwork, and determination throughout the day — a wonderful start to their sporting journey with Whitwick!

The Great Fire of London

To launch their new history topic, Year 2 took part in an exciting **immersion day** that transformed them into detectives! Armed with curiosity and keen observation skills, the children explored a series of clues to uncover the mystery behind the **Gunpowder Plot**. Their enthusiasm and teamwork shone throughout the activity, sparking plenty of interest and discussion as they began to learn about this fascinating period in history.

Year 3

Year 3 Journey Back in Time!

Year 3 have had an exciting start to the year with their fascinating topic "Stone Age to Iron Age." The children have been exploring what life was like thousands of years ago — and have had plenty of hands-on fun along the way!

One of the highlights was their immersive Stone Age day, where pupils created their own paints using natural resources such as mud, berries, and chalk. They then used these to recreate cave paintings, just as early humans did. A messy but memorable experience really brought history to life!

In science, the class have been studying the different types of rocks — igneous, metamorphic, and sedimentary — and even had the chance to go fossil hunting. Everyone enjoyed discovering how rocks are formed and what fossils can tell us about the past.

To continue their journey through history, Year 3 recently visited Tamworth Castle, home to one of the last Norman towers in England. During their visit, they took part in exciting workshops where they prepared a feast in the banquet hall, set the tables like medieval servants, and even trained as medieval soldiers!

The trip was a fantastic way to see history come alive, and Year 3 cannot wait to keep learning more about how people lived and worked in the past.

Year 4

We started the year off with a trip to the rainforest immersion day, where the children tasted and smelt various fruits and spices, which grow in the rainforest regions and they also listened to the sounds of the jungle, before undertaking life study drawings of exotic plants and flowers. The children had a fabulous time, challenging themselves to try new things and asking lots of pertinent questions to further their learning.

Our 'Rainforest Rumble' topic has allowed the children to think like Geographers, practising and apply geography skills and expand their technical vocabulary. In English, we have learnt the story of 'The Great Kapok Tree' and used descriptive language for setting descriptions and story writing.

In maths we have consolidated our knowledge of place value and practiced our addition and subtraction skills. We have developed our understanding of our relationships in PSHE and in PE, we have enjoyed learning new skills in both dodgeball and handball. It's been a great first half -term and the children are very excited for our new Ancient Egyptian topic, starting with our visit from Queen Cleopatra! The children learned all about life in ancient Egypt including jobs, farming and mummification.





Year 4 have made a fantastic start to the new school year and have settled in beautifully! The children have shown great enthusiasm, curiosity, and teamwork as they've embraced all areas of their learning.

Our first topic, *Rainforest Rumble*, was a huge success. The pupils explored the layers of the rainforest, the incredible animals and plants that live there and the importance of protecting these vital habitats. Their research and creativity truly shone through as they wrote and published their own non-chronological reports, filled with fascinating facts and colourful illustrations. It was wonderful to see how proud they were of their finished pieces!

We've now begun our new topic, *The Ancient Egyptians*, which is already off to a fantastic start. The children were introduced to the topic in an exciting way—with a special visit from a "queen" who helped transport us back in time to ancient Egypt! Since then, we've started exploring life along the River Nile, Egyptian gods and goddesses, and the fascinating world of mummification. The children are thoroughly enjoying uncovering the mysteries of this ancient civilisation.





Alongside our topic work, we've been developing our musical talents by learning to play the djembe. The pupils have loved creating rhythms together, learning about tempo and dynamics, and experiencing the joy of making music as a group.

We've also been lucky to have sessions with our local badminton coach, where the children have been learning new skills, improving their coordination, and developing great sportsmanship. It's been brilliant to see their confidence grow with every session.

It's been a busy and exciting start to the year, and we're so proud of how well Year 4 have settled into their new routines. We can't wait to see what the rest of the term brings!

Year 5

This half-term, Year 5 have enjoyed a wide range of exciting and engaging learning experiences. In Maths, children have explored place value, ordering and comparing numbers, rounding, and addition and subtraction, including checking answers using the inverse operation.

In English, we have enjoyed a Japanese folk tale about a fisherman and a mermaid and produced imaginative non-chronological reports about an underwater world.

Our science lessons have taken us on a journey through the solar system, while in Geography, we've investigated the challenges facing Poorly Planet Earth.

The highlight of the half-term was our amazing performances at the Coalville Arts Festival, where the children delivered two powerful World War II-themed pieces. Their confidence and creativity were outstanding!





Year 6

A Brilliant Beginning!

The first eight weeks in Year 6 have flown by and what a busy yet exciting start it has been! Our fantastic children have thrown themselves into every opportunity, working with determination, stepping into leadership roles and having plenty of fun along the way.

One of the highlights early on was the Team Captain campaigns. The candidates impressed us with their enthusiasm and creativity as they put together their campaign videos, hoping to be chosen to represent their houses. Their confidence and teamwork really shone through and we were delighted by the amount of support they received from their peers. Congratulations to those children who were

elected – we are sure you will lead Mars, Neptune, Saturn and Jupiter with pride and determination!

Alongside campaigning, Year 6 have also been preparing for other important responsibilities across school. Many pupils have stepped up as members of the Worry-Less Team, Playground Pals, Reading Pals and Librarians. These roles give our children the chance to support others, develop strong communication skills and make a positive difference to our school community. We are so proud of their willingness to volunteer and know they will flourish in these positions throughout the year.

Pupils are welcome to wear **blue and white chequered summer dresses or jumpsuits**, in keeping with our school colours.

Please ensure that **all uniform items are clearly named**, so that any lost items can be quickly returned.

Wearing the correct uniform helps promote a **sense of belonging** and ensures that all our pupils feel part of the school community. Thank you for helping us maintain these high standards.

Safeguarding

Protection Children is everyone's business!!

At Whitwick St John the Baptist CE Primary School, we understand the utmost importance of having robust systems for protecting children and safeguarding their welfare. All our staff and volunteers are vigilant and alert to any potential concerns about our pupils. If you have any concerns, please speak to the head teacher. We will treat your concern seriously and with the utmost care.

Parking

Please remember to park only in legal parking spots and to respect and adhere to all posted no-parking zones. Your cooperation in maintaining a safe environment around our school is greatly appreciated. Let us work together to ensure the safety of all our students and families.



We would kindly like to remind everyone to drive and park safely and considerately when dropping off or picking up children from school. Unfortunately, we have seen and heard reports of some dangerous and inconsiderate parking and manoeuvres.

The safety of our children is always our top priority, so please ensure you are parking appropriately and driving with care around the school.

How Can You Help?

- Park further away and walk to school
- Keep your speed down
- Park in a safe place following the Highway Code.
- Do not park on pavements
- Turn your engine off as soon as you have parked
- Keep the school gates clear at all times stopping here, even to drop off your child for a short period of time, is dangerous
- Do not enter the school car park unless authorised to do so
- Do not block local residents' drives
- Leave the middle of the road free, with enough room for other road users to easily pass through
- Leave enough room for emergency vehicles to easily pass through
- Make sure your child leaves and enters your vehicle safely to and from the pavement
- Check for pedestrians and cyclists before opening a car door
- Take care when reversing
- Remember it only takes one vehicle to be parked inconsiderately for there to be an impact on accessibility to emergency services or others. Do not be that one.

This funding will help provide valuable support for your child.
