



Evidencing the Impact of the Primary PE and Sport Premium 2022-2023

Schools receive P.E and Sports Premium Funding based on the number of pupils in Years 1 to Year 6. At Whitwick Saint John the Baptist C.E. Primary School our aim is for all pupils to lead healthy and active lifestyles, develop health and emotional well-being and to develop a lifelong love of sport and physical exercise. We are keen to allocate the funding appropriately to achieve our goals.

Key achievements 2022 - 2023	Areas for further development
<p>Over the last year, Whitwick St John the Baptist C E Primary School has fully recognised the importance of curriculum and extra-curriculum PE. We value the opportunities physical education provides for our children and the effect it has on their health, both physical and mental, and their well-being. As a school we are determined to take every opportunity available to us to sustain and increase the sporting participation of our children and we feel that this year we have met all three criteria of sporting success, increasing participation and engagement with community sport and strong club links.</p> <p><u>Sporting Success</u></p> <p>As well as increased participation levels, the school has had an outstanding year of sporting success. The Year 5/6 Girls' Football Team won the Level 2 NWLSSP Excel Tournament and went on to represent NWL in the county competition. They then came runners-up in the Kirby Shield tournament. Our Year 4-5 Girls' Football Team won the Rose Bowl event and our Year 4-5 Mixed Football Team won their Rose Bowl event which were both played at Coalville Town FC. Our Year 4-5 football team represented NWL in the county event replacing another school as they were runners-up in the Rose Bowl last year. The Year 5-6 Tag Rugby Team won the Coalville section of the NWLSSP Excel event and our Year 5-6 Girls' Table Tennis team won the NWLSSP Excel Tournament and went onto represent NWL in the county event. Our Year 5-6 Quick Sticks Hockey Team won the Coalville section of the Level 2 NWLSSP event and our Year 1-2 Key Steps 1 Gymnastic team won the NWLSSP event meaning they represented NWL at the county event which they also won becoming county champions! We were presented with the NWLSSP 'Spirit of the Games' Award on five occasions at the events by our peer schools meaning we won the Spirit of the Games Award. Finally, our standout performance of the year was the Year 4 - 5 Badminton team who won two rounds of NWL competitions to qualify for the county final and then followed it up by winning the Leicestershire County competition for the second year in a row. The school once again was awarded the School Games 'Gold Mark Sports Award' which recognises a school's dedication to sport and health within and outside the school curriculum.</p> <p><u>Participation and Sportsmanship</u></p> <p>The school has a strong and active P.E. programme that ensures children develop the fundamental skills needed for sport whilst also developing the spirit of the game's values of Passion, Self-Belief, Respect, Honesty, Determination and Teamwork. We have a well-established 'active lunchtimes' which flourished last year, with twenty-six children acting as our Year 5/6 'Play Coaches' running games and activities for other children across the whole school. The school has high levels of engagement with the school sports partnership on all levels (festivals, developmental competitions and performance competitions). attendances at Level 2 competitions was 312. We entered into four Level 3 competitions due to success at Level 2 events. We also entered separate competitions including the NWL cross country events, Kirby Shield (mixed and girls), Rose Bowl (mixed and girls) and Saffron Lane athletics event. Through the NWLSSP, the school trained Sports Ambassadors, our PE Lead attended PLT meetings, two HAP children attended a HAP Day for higher attaining pupils and forty-seven children attended an alternative Sport session designed to give less active children a sporting opportunity (Flag Football). Our biggest achievement in terms of sportsmanship this year was being awarded the 'Spirit of the Games' trophy at the 'NWLDC Let's Get Moving Awards'. This achievement was voted for by other schools at events and tournaments throughout the year recognising our school's excellent sportsmanship, representing the School Games Values: passion, teamwork, respect, determination, honesty and self-belief.

Community Links

A large part of the schools' success this year (Girl's football, badminton & tennis) can be largely attributed to the schools continuing development of club links. The school has a longstanding connection with Coalville Town Ravenettes which has provided a pathway for girls who are interested in the game at school to take up the game outside of school. The school has a strong partnership (11 years) with Whitwick Junior Badminton Club with in-school coaching taking place from their qualified coaches; this has led to many pupils taking up the sport outside of school. In addition, the school has an in-house tennis coach which has continued to inspire and motivate the pupils to develop their love of the game. Last year, we continued to have club links with Expressions Dance and Theatre Arts Academy and Broom Leys Cricket Club and we re-established our links with both Coalville Rugby Club and Grace Dieu Junior Netball club with children from our school attending both clubs and representing their teams. We have already this year, started to promote Coalville Rugby Club, Eclipse and TDA Dance Academies to our children.
