<p><b><u>Sporting Participation and Whole School Focus on Increased Fitness Levels</u></b>                      The impact of COVID has brought significant challenges this year. The children came into school with noticeably lower fitness and activity levels and in many cases a lack of resilience. Creating a dynamic and active daily curriculum has been extremely important to redress the potential long-term health issues of inactivity.
